An URGEnt Weekend

Events featuring Rev. Wayne "Coach" Gordon were both an Inspiration and Success Concert of Praise, URGEnt Presentation and Tour, URGEncy Collection, Community Forum, and Family Conversation

It was one weekend with one message that resonated loud and clear for several hundred greater Rochester residents, nonprofit agency representatives and officials. On November 5-6, four events sponsored by Project URGE drove home the need — and the solutions — for bringing lasting change to the lives and futures of under-resourced and atrisk urban Rochester community.

From the first notes of the Friday night Concert of Praise, it became clear that this was a weekend of crossing racial, social, economic and denominational barriers. People from all backgrounds and perspectives raised their voices in praise to one God — through music, dance, and spoken word. Flag teams, worship teams, and PUSH Physical Theatre all pointed toward the message of the night, and of the weekend.

Featured guest speaker at all four events, Pastor Wayne (Coach) Gordon, challenged Christians to "get into the cages" with the community's problems and lead the troubled out into more hopeful lives. Coach Gordon, who has 35 years of experience as an effective change agent, is the pastor of Lawndale Community Church in Chicago, Illinois. During that time his church has successfully provided 69,000 impoverished residents with spiritual care, medical and dental services, job and housing development, youth, educational and legal services.

The first and last words of his book, "Real Hope in Chicago," said it all — "I love living in Lawndale." An unlikely transplant in an impoverished, black community, Gordon has stood the test of time and been an example for all who want to be true catalysts for change. Throughout the weekend Gordon shared a high-energy message of how Christ taught him that he belonged in Lawndale and needed to listen to the communities' needs, pray about them, and follow God's direction. This became his ministry model — and one he promotes wherever he goes. It's also the message of the Christian Community Development Association (CCDA), which he helped found, whose mission is to inspire, train and connect Christians who seek to bear

witness to the Kingdom of God by reclaiming and restoring under-resourced communities.

Gordon said that although Lawndale and Rochester have a dramatically different economic status, the need for the Gospel of Jesus Christ and hope to hopeless is the same. Among Rochester's woes are a violent crime rate almost twice the state rate, increasing homelessness in the same city that serves as headquarters for three worldwide companies: Kodak, Xerox, Baush and Lomb, and a city school district with a graduation rate of just over 50 percent in 2010.

An URGEnt Weekend Continued

URGE affiliate member organizations and ministries like Foodlink, which serves a food bank for food cupboards and shelters, Gerhardt Ministry Center, and Grace Community Village which offers medical services and youth activities, and Recovery House of Rochester for those recovering from addictions and in need of housing, are addressing Rochester's hopelessness. Dozens of ministries and services like these were featured during the URGEnt Presentation and Tour which gave a face-to-face opportunity for nearly 100 residents to volunteer and support urban ministries and agencies, including after-school programs and summer camps for at-risk youth, soup kitchens, clothing ministries, entrepreneurial education, drug and alcohol rehab, food pantries, health/wellness and more. A Place of Hope, Embracing Options, Salvation Army, Outreach Temple Home Mission, Youth for Christ, MINO - Mothers In Need of Others, Community Lutheran Ministry, and Project URGE.

Teresa Caldwell and her son Alex Ruhland of Henrietta heard about the tour from a co-member at church. They said "they were looking to serve beyond their church."

One dedicated and ten-year ministry example is Amy, a newlywed who directs the Demitri House, a homeless shelter. Even Amy's children have grown up helping around the shelter and her initially reluctant husband, Scott, testified that he has grown to respect and find satisfaction in helping the homeless men of the house. Demitri House has volunteers who sleep overnight as overseers throughout the week. With examples and involvement opportunities presented during the URGE weekend, many visitors left with clear ways that they can help improve their community.









"Family Conversation" with Rev. Wayne Gordon, which included Project URGE volunteers and affiliated collaborative members, held in the afternoon after the conclusion of the URGEnt Presentation and Tour.

Besides funding, the most requested need of the URGE ministries was for servants. Maggie Harris, who has served in The Community Lutheran Outreach on Joseph Avenue since 1990 told tour visitors, "Our greatest need is for volunteers" in such activities as their Angel to Angel friendship program.

While the URGEnt Presentation and Tour were underway, The URGEncy Collection received donations of over 400 gently used coats, 10 large bags of gloves, hats and towels, as well as over 70 pounds of canned goods and non-perishables, which were distributed to homeless shelters, soup kitchens and other organizations serving the under-served in the Rochester area. This was made possible in part by the generosity of area churches and ministries mobilized to receive donations.

A Community Forum was also held during the URGEnt Presentation and Tour. Area officials and agency representatives gathered with Coach Gordon and event organizer, Garry Manuel, to outline collaboration opportunities and eliminate potential barriers.

Wrapping up the whole weekend was a luncheon and debrief for partnering agencies and ministries with Gordon and Manuel to recap the weekend and look ahead toward future collaboration.

The result? Project URGE facilitated individuals, agencies and ministries to take the next step toward affecting lasting change in the Rochester community. And hopefully, Coach Gordon's legacy — and mission — extends far beyond Chicago into our own Rochester neighborhoods.

How amazing is that?





The Life Ballet April 30—4pm




Amanda Rose Belmont School of Ballet

Local Mental Wellness Group Funds Cultural and Educational Experiences for Students

Future Promise Partners, a mental wellness group that offers supportive friendships and volunteer opportunities to people living with mental health diagnoses, presented The Children's School with the proceeds of a recent craft sale fundraiser that will support educational field trips that help broaden the cultural experiences of a diverse student population. FPP was organized over a year ago by Lorrie Boyce, who works as a Supportive Partner at Compeer Rochester, Inc., a non-profit mentoring organization that serves youth and adults in mental health treatment and youth with incarcerated parents. With years of experience in the mental health field, Boyce observed first-hand the debilitating effects of the negative stigma surrounding mental illnesses on the people diagnosed with them, and endeavored to make raising community awareness a priority.

"When the group first started, many of the people said that they felt like damaged goods and were suffering from an extremely low sense of self-esteem and self-worth," Boyce explained. "They wanted to make a difference, and I wanted to help them realize their full potential." The group chose the name Future Promise Partners because they wanted to reach out to the next generation of children, offering them support and encouragement that many of the members did not receive growing up, and helping to proactively address mental or emotional challenges they are encountering at an early stage of development.

Past community service projects have included building and delivering gingerbread houses and beanie babies to children in the hospital, participating in the Box Tops for Education program, and hosting craft sales that benefit local youth-serving organizations like The Children's School. FPP hopes to organize future projects on a monthly basis, and is currently in the process of collecting donations for a local food cupboard.

Engaging in these opportunities empowers members to learn new skills and engage with others in a positive way. "They're going to be able to live better in society because they're going to feel better about themselves," said Boyce. "That's what gets them through." The organizations on the receiving end of the group's efforts benefit as well.



Become A Mentor For

Many Cultures-One Community

Few bonds in life are more influential than those between a young person and an adult. A new family who has arrived to us through the Refugee Resettlement program is a great way to share and teach people about different cultures and how they affect our lives.

As you begin your journey toward becoming a mentor, you will need to thoroughly understand the role of mentoring. Look at a role you are already familiar with. Most of us have had a supervisor, a boss or coach who has made a positive difference in our lives. Those people wore many hats. They acted as, delegators, role models, cheerleaders, policy enforcers, advocates, and friends. As a mentor you will wear these same hats.

Mentors understand the need to assume a number of different roles during the course of a mentoring relationship, but successful mentors also share the same basic qualities:

- A sincere desire to be involved with a young person.
- Respect for young people.
- Active listener.
- Empathy.
- See solutions and opportunities.
- Be flexible and open.
- Doing activities with them not for them

As you and your mentee begin your relationship; exploring values, interests and goals, you will find yourself making a difference and having a positive effect on their life. What you may also be surprised to see is that you will be learning more about yourself, too. Mentoring doesn't just affect the young person. Mentoring is a shared opportunity for learning and growth. Project URGE: What it is NOT

I have been in the co-director role with Project URGE for a little over eight months now and sense that some churches and organizations are reluctant to partner with Project URGE because of some misconceptions about our organization. This article is my attempt to clarify why Project URGE is interested in building collaborative, working relationships among individuals, churches and organizations.

Our organization's mission is based on the following passage of scripture: Matthew 25: 34-40 - Then the King will say to those on His right hand, 'Come, you blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: For I was hungry and you gave Me food; I was thirsty and you gave Me drink; I was a stranger and you took Me in; I was naked and you clothed Me; I was sick and you visited Me; I was in prison and you came to Me.' Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink? When did we see You a stranger and take You in, or naked and clothe You? Or when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?' And the King will answer and say to them, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me.' [NKJV]

Although many churches and organizations would like to provide service ministry programs to 'the least of these My brethren,' not every church or organization is big enough to be able to provide all the services needed on their own. Project URGE doesn't believe that every organization needs to be starting its own programs. Project URGE is about recruiting individuals as well as teams of people from different churches and organizations to work together and support established urban ministries that are already serving people in need.

Project URGE is not trying to attract people and resources away from any organization. Project URGE is trying to recruit volunteers and funding from multiple area churches and organizations so that together, we can do much more than any one group could do alone.

Project URGE is not suggesting that members of the Project URGE "team" will somehow reach doctrinal unity. We are a Christian, faith-based organization but we also know that we live in a world with many divergent faith traditions even within a single denomination. Although our personal religious beliefs are very important to us, we are not interested in doctrinal debates and are more than content to leave judgment up to the Lord. As 1 Corinthians 4:5 states: Therefore judge nothing before the time, until the Lord comes, who will both bring to light the hidden things of darkness and reveal the counsels of hearts. Then each one's praise will come from God. [NKJV] Project URGE is committed to loving respect toward all people and all faith traditions, not doctrinal agreement with all people and all faith traditions.

The focus of Project URGE is on loving and serving people in need at the grassroots level: giving food to the hungry, clothing to the naked, friendship for those who are lonely, healing for the sick and deliverance for those in bondage. Do these types of ministries fit with the mission of your church or organization? Are there people in your church or organization who feel called to work in urban ministry?

If you or your organization have felt God's call to serve those less fortunate, let Project URGE help you find a place to serve. We are looking for individuals and teams who want to answer God's call in their lives by loving and serving others in tangible ways. As 1 John 3:18 states: My little children, let us not love in word or tongue, but in deed and in truth. [NJKV]
